A long-time member of GOIS and the American Iris Society, Jim served many roles over the years. He was both a president for GOIS and an RVP for the Region. He served on countless committees including the 1990 AIS National Convention in Omaha.

As an emeritus judge for the American Iris Society, Jim was incredibly knowledgeable about iris of all varieties including arils and arilbreds which he grew very well.

He was also a "pollen dauber" introducing both bearded and beardless varieties. His "Oxmoor Hills" is a particularly handsome and faithful rebloomer for our area.

Many of our long-term members will recall both Jim and his wife Ruth as their first contact with GOIS. A couple of such gracious hospitality as to be legend. Jim and Ruth were always welcoming a new member into the wonderful world of iris and many of us still grow iris or

other plants that were given to us by Jim or Ruth. ## Sales and Auction News

Thank you to all the members who contributed to our sales events this year. As you know the proceeds of these events fund our programs, activities, and the upkeep of our display garden. Membership dues cannot cover all our expenses so we are heavily dependent on these events to subsidize our activities.

This year our members contributed rhizomes in record numbers, with over 300 varieties donated for the table sales. This year 50 new introductions were available for our auction through the generosity of our commercial growers, Keith Keppel, Superstition Gardens, Sisters Iris Farm, and Comanche Acres who all sold their newest varieties for less than catalog to aid our fundraising efforts.

The net proceeds from our sale/auction this year were just over \$2,190. Our members can be proud of their efforts and thankful that we will be able to continue our work to preserve the historic cultivars at our display garden and promote the love of iris to a new generation of gardeners.
