

# Garden Marker Bonus Program



## Back to Basics

Iris Rhizome

Hopefully you've gotten all your iris purchases in the ground by now. If not, it is time to get them into the garden or to nurture them in pots over the winter. They need time to get themselves established before the hard freezes come next month.

If you've expanded your collection to include some reblooming varieties you should have started to see some bloom. Golden Encore and Queen Dorothy were both blooming as of Labor day at our display garden. Immortality and Bountiful Harvest have been spotted around town

blooming gamely in the hellstrips that many perennials eschew. Watch your reblooming clumps closely for the emerging bloomstalks. You may wish to cover anything that is putting up stalks on those evenings when frost warnings have been issued.

If you do have reblooming varieties you can help the Reblooming Iris Society by reporting what and when rebloom occurs in your garden. Simply send your general location (City, State), Variety, and Date to Wayne Messer at: wrmesser@gmail.com. He'll post to the Region 21 website

so iris hybridizers and collectors of remonant varieties can monitor the performance of their cultivars.

October is perfect for planting the minor bulbous *Iris Reticulata, Danfordiae,* and Dutch iris. They tend to be inexpensive, carefree, and quite lovely in the early Spring garden.

If you have new plantings you may want to consider adding mulch after the ground freezes. It's the freeze/thaw that is hard on overwintering iris and a little mulch applied judiciously can help.

Fall is the time of year when we can relax a bit, pull a few weeds, and truly enjoy the beauty of our gardens.

- Plant bulbous iris at the fronts of your borders to give a splash of iris color early next Spring.
