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# A Time to Dig...



Iris rhizomes ready to divide

Now is the time to divide and transplant your bearded iris varieties. If you've noticed a decline in bloom it is probably time to divide the clump.

You'll need a few tools to accomplish the job. A good garden fork to lift the clumps, a knife or heavy duty scissors to cut rhizomes, scissors to trim leaves and a good quality marker to write on the fans.

Use your garden fork to dig under the rhizomes and lift the clump, being careful to loosen the roots. This is best done when there is a modest amount of moisture in the soil; too dry and it can become difficult to get your fork in the soil, too wet and you risk tearing the roots off your plants. Shake off any loose soil so that you can see the

rhizome and roots.

Rhizomes are technically an "underground" stem with nodes or growing points and roots. The leaf "fan" is the furthest growing point on the plant but you may notice additional side nodes developing along the rhizome, these will make additional fans and contribute to a nice lush garden plant, these are "premium" sized rhizomes. As the plant grows it "walks" away from the older part of the rhizome, which can be distinguished by its lack of roots or side nodes. Trim this "old mother" back to where the roots are attached leaving you with single rhizomes each with a leaf fan and roots. Mark the name on the fans now so that you don't lose track of the variety while you work.

Examine the leaves removing any that are loose or damaged. In our windy environment it is advisable to trim the fans down to about 6-10 inches. This will help to keep the plant from toppling over before it gets its roots reestablished when planting.

Select out 1-5 large rhizomes to replant in your garden. Discard small, damaged, or rhizomes with leaves but no roots. If you have rhizomes left please consider donating them to GOIS' rhizome sale to help support our club activities.

You will receive a coupon good for one rhizome from our table sales for every 10 rhizomes you donate.

# Prepping Iris for Sale

Every one likes a bargain, fess up, we know you've all dug through produce bins looking for the biggest and the best. So do our customers!

When selecting rhizomes for sale (and replanting) pick the largest rhizome, with the best roots and leaves. Better to have two market ready plants than 10 that won't sell.

Trim the fan to about ten inches and write the variety name with a permanent marker on the center leaves. Wash any remain-

ing soil from them and allow to dry before packing them into paper bags for transport to the sale.
