It's a pleasant time to be in the garden, cool and crisp with the fall blooming plants a sweet bonus to the end of the season.

It's also time to keep a close eye on your reblooming iris with an ear out for frost warnings. Watch for those late emerging stalks, they're vulnerable to late frosts. Cover them or if there is color showing cut them for an inside bouquet when freeze warnings

are forecast.

If they do get nipped just remove the stalk as close to the rhizome as you can. Trim fans where they begin to tip over (generally about 6-8 inches) to allow the plant to continue to take in nutrients over the dwindling season.

We have two activities remaining for the year. The first is the annual garden clean-up at Mahoney Park. Join us to trim foliage and do a final weeding in the beds. We'll meet at 8:30 AM to allow the frost to burn off before working. Our final activity is the pot-



luck, nobody cooks like gardeners so bring your friends and family for this fun event. Trade stories of your trials and triumphs as we close out the gardening season together.

After the Bloom is Gone...



Fall Arrangement

Do you need just one more hurrah before the season ends? Try a fall inspired arrangement to lift your spirits.

Steven Elder, senior gardener at Lauritzen Gardens, leads design classes at the gardens. He recently shared some tips to seasonal arranging during a presentation to the South Omaha Horticultural Society.

Rather than filling your container with soil Steven recommends using a sturdy bucket packed with floral foam (wet oasis™) that will sit inside your decorative container. [Recycled kitty litter buckers and the

like work perfectly, their handles make lifting them in and out a breeze.]

A collection of large bare branches, branches with fall leaves still attached and various pods and seed heads all make great additions to a fall arrangement.

Steven recommends that you start with the largest branches in the center and then evenly work in your next smaller branches.
Clustering your decorative pods and seed heads in groups of three will give them more "presence" in the arrangement. He always adds an element that will retain a bright pop of color, such as yarrow

(Achillea), or freeze-dried pomegranates. Have some fun and add feathers or small gourds and pumpkins. Add a floppy element such as corn leaves or the last of your cannas to counter-balance all the upright material. Finish it off with a "skirt" of moss or dried twig garland to conceal your mechanics.

So instead of composting all those fallen leaves and branches try creating an arrangement with them!

And consider taking a class from Steven and Lauritzen Gardens during the long winter months.


