LIS SPRING SHOW

The LIS show is set for 1-4:30 PM on Saturday May 14, 2016. Please note the new location is the Cafeteria of Meadow Lane Elementary School, 7200 Vine Street, Lincoln NE.

We will use rectangular tables at one end of the cafeteria for grooming and preparing iris stalks and arrangements. There will be no special room available to store LIS or personal supplies during judging or while the show is open to the public. While the show is being judged you will be asked to wait in the vestibule/hallway. There will be no luncheon on site for this year's show.

We encourage everyone to participate in the show and enter iris stalks and arrangements, English boxes, educational displays, etc. This is an official American Iris Society sanctioned show. As such, it will be judged and there are ribbons and trophies to be won! A special invitation goes to our newer members to enter the show. There are always helpful LIS members available to offer advice on entering the show. Even if you are not ready to enter the show, stop by during the preparation time 7:30-10 AM. It's a great opportunity to learn as you watch everyone prepare their irises and arrangements, and to see what goes into the preparation and set up of the show. And, of course be sure to stick around in the afternoon when the visitors arrive to view our gorgeous irises.

Arrangements are a great way to begin entering the show. To help you plan ahead and to start you thinking about what you might put together with your beautiful irises, here are this year's categories for Artistic Arrangements. Our theme this year is America the Beautiful!

Class 1: Oh Beautiful, for Spacious Skies- A contemporary look, with height

Class 2: For Amber Waves of Grain- A design showing motion using yellows, tans and creams reminiscent of the country's breadbasket

Class 3: For Purple Mountain Majesties- Use blues, purples and whites for this centerpiece

Class 4: Above the Fruited Plain- A multicolored display incorporating fruit & vegetables

Youth Only: And Crown They Good With Brotherhood- A design using an accessory you might find in your brother's room- or your friend's brother's room

A few rules for arrangements: An exhibitor may enter only one arrangement per class. Irises must be the predominant flower, but you do not need to know the name of the irises. Accessories are acceptable and encouraged. Other plant materials (fresh or dried) are ok, but no artificial/fake plant materials.

Bloom season and the LIS show is right around the corner! It is important that all traveling trophies be polished up and on display at the show May 14th. For that reason, 2015 winners, **please bring the trophies to the April meeting**. Please give them a wipe down before packing them safely in the boxes you received them in. It will help out the Show Committee tremendously!

FRIDAY NIGHT SET UP -May 13th

7:00 PM- Meet at Meadow Lane Elementary School Unload show materials, arrange tables, add tablecloths, place section and award cards on tables. Assemble vases & bases.

SATURDAY A.M.

7:30 AM-10:00 AM- PREPARATION TIME Groom and prepare iris stalks, attach completed entry cards, set on placement table. Placement committee moves irises to appropriate section on the show tables. Assemble arrangements and place directly on show table. Classification committee peruses show to check for mis-identified, mis-classified and mislabeled entries.

10:00 AM- ENTRY CLOSED. All irises and arrangements must be on the tables.

10:00 AM -10:15 AM- <u>MEETING OF JUDGES, CLERKS, SHOW CHAIRMEN</u> to preview show and determine order of judging. These will be the only individuals allowed in the cafeteria at this time.

10:15 AM to finish- JUDGING OF SHOW. During this time any excess LIS materials are to be neatly stowed away with excess materials taken to vehicles. Show participants are welcome to remain on premises in the vestibule/entry way to the school.

SATURDAY P.M.

1:00 PM- SHOW OPENS TO THE PUBLIC. LIS members work the Greeter Table or float around the room, talk with visitors about irises, answer questions, promote Auction/Sale, hand out sale fliers, encourage everyone to vote for Viewer's Choice Iris. Please wear your LIS name tag.

4:00 PM- VIEWER'S CHOICE VOTING CONCLUDES. Ballots are counted

4:30 PM – SHOW CLOSES

4:30 PM-4:35 PM- All entrants should remove any iris stalks they wish to keep.

4:35 PM- <u>IRIS BLOOMSTALK SALE</u>- visitors may purchase bloom stalks. <u>ARRANGEMENTS ARE NOT TO BE SOLD OR TAKEN</u> unless by previous arrangement with the **EXHIBITOR**.

4:45 PM- <u>CLEAN AND PACK</u>- Empty water from vases, return bases and vases to marked boxes. Fold up tablecloths etc.

*Helpful Grooming Supplies- Cotton balls, Q-Tips, tissues, sharp pointed scissors.

**Win a Traveling Trophy? BEFORE you take a trophy see the SHOW CHAIR. All trophies must be signed out. Some trophies need to be engraved before they are awarded. Best of section certificates, medals and engraved trophies will be awarded at a later meeting.
