Lincoln Iris Society Show Results – May 16, 2015

The LIS Show was held in mid-May this year, so that it would not conflict with the AIS national convention the following week. Usually, having it a week early would result in mostly medians, but the season was also early, so Tall Beardeds were still more than half of the volume of the show. There were 101 TBs and 53 Historics. Most of the historics are also TBs, so a high percentage of the show was represented by Tall Bearded irises. But, many classes of irises were represented. This show was also the first to be held at St. Andrews church, a major change in location for us from the past many years at Southeast Community College. The show was very well attended and well received, and we had a record number of 24 exhibitors (incl. 6 youth), as well as a very high number of entries!! Congratulations to Marjorie Lionberger for Best Specimen of the Show with her TB entry, 'Narrow Margin'.

Below is a summary of the results of the 2015 Lincoln Iris Society Show

24 Exibitors: 18 adults – 219 entries, **6 youth** – 25 entries. **Total entries (244)** 224 stalks, 6 seedlings, 3 collections, and 11 arrangements

Breakdown by Categories - 10 SDB's, 15 IB's, 7 BB's, 13 MTB's, 101 TB's, 1 AB, 24 Siberian- and & Species, 53 Historics, (34 pre 1950 and 19 post-1949), 0 Other Irises, 3 Collections, 0 English Boxes, 6 seedling, 11 arrangements and 0 educational exhibits.
