Opal Wulf

We were saddened recently to hear of the passing of Opal Wulf on October 6, 2015. She was a longtime and loyal member of the Lincoln Iris Society and the American Iris Society, as well as a hybridizer of irises.

Opal and her late husband Henry joined AIS and the Lincoln Iris Society in the early 1980s and quickly became involved in the activities of our local group and Region 21. Opal participated regularly in the LIS Show, preparing the Show Schedule, as well as entering numerous irises over the years. She won Best of Show on three occasions, the first in 1984. She was also the recipient of the Most Blue Ribbons award in 1992 and 1994. Opal and Henry's major contribution to LIS was managing the annual sale for many years, including donating many rhizomes from their own garden. Opal served as LIS membership chairman and also appeared on KZUM radio broadcasts of "How's It Growing" for a few years, publicizing the club's events. Opal and Henry were Honorary Life Members of the Lincoln Iris Society. The LIS Youth program was a special interest of Opal and Henry's. They mentored several youth members and their families over the years. And, Opal sponsored a Mother's Day iris project at 3 or 4 elementary schools in Lincoln. Each year she would pot dwarf irises with cute names in as many as 100 small white pots, then deliver them to first grade classrooms at these schools. The children finger-painted the pots and then gave them to their mothers as a Mother's Day gift. Other LIS members often helped prepare the pots, but Opal did the great bulk of the work herself, and delivered the potted irises to the schools.

On the national and regional level, Opal was a member of several American Iris Society Sections, including the Median Iris Society (MIS) and the Tall Bearded Iris Society (TBIS). In fact, she was the Vice-President of the TBIS for a year in 2001-2002. She also served a term as Regional Vice President (RVP) of AIS Region 21 and she and Henry were recipients of the Region 21 Distinguished Service Award for 1995. Both Opal and Henry were AIS Judges, Opal becoming a Master Judge. She also served the region as the Judge's Training Chair.

For the 1990 AIS national Convention, headquartered in Omaha, Opal and Henry were asked to chair the convention, which they did. And a huge job that was! During that convention, Opal and Henry's garden, Wulf's Backachers, was one of the host gardens in the Lincoln area. They opened their garden for many spring regional conventions after that, including the Region 21/TBIS convention in 2004.

Opal's hybridizing was a large part of her iris "life" as well. Over the years, from 1993 to 2004, she registered 40 irises with the American Iris Society. Of these, 20 were MTBs, 9 TBs, 8 BBs, 1 SDB, 1 IB, and 1 Siberian iris. Of the 40 registered, 25 were introduced. Two, 'Wistful Wisteria' and 'Snickerdoodle' won HMs (Honorable Mention) in the AIS awards system, and in 2002, 'Wistful Wisteria' was awarded an AM (Award of Merit) in the MTB class. Many LIS members still grow some of Opal's creations in their gardens. Miniature Tall Bearded Irises always were a special interest of hers. She and Henry sponsored the Best Miniature Tall Bearded Iris award trophy for the LIS show. Alas, the first trophy for that award (a metal sculpture) was severely damaged in a fire in the late 1990s. Opal replaced it with a lovely stone vase depicting Miniature Tall Bearded Irises. In addition to her own irises, Opal maintained a near complete collection of Allan Ensminger's irises at her home, and also introduced irises for Allan after his farm was sold.

Opal Wulf was a dedicated and avid supporter of irises and the Lincoln Iris Society. She gave of her time and talents for the club. We could always count on her to take charge of an activity and "make it happen". And then there were her cookies. Her motto was "Have cookies, will travel!" We loved her for that and being part of our lives. We will miss her.
