The little pasque flowers and alliums in the spring along with the MDB irises, then, the SDB irises along with the primroses, then the MTB, BB and TB irises at the same time as the peonies, columbine, bellflowers and other perennials. My gardens are ever changing pictures throughout the spring and summer.

I grew up on a farm northeast of Brandon, Manitoba and every summer I helped my mom with her huge garden. The only flowers I remember mom having were petunias and of course the little Johnny jump-ups that self-seeded in the raspberry patch each year.

In the summer of 1981 I worked for four months at Patmore Nursery Sales in Brandon, potting and selling all kinds of plants from the annuals to the perennials, to the trees and shrubs. I learned so much that summer about plants, but I do not remember selling any irises there though.

About 25 years ago, I joined the Brandon Garden Club. About 16 years ago, BJ Jackson was the special speaker there, talking about daylilies. Well, I was hooked. A friendship soon developed, and many purchases and participating in group orders (along with BJ) came in following years.

In 1995 we moved to our acreage just north of Kemnay, Manitoba. Starting with landscaping a small flowerbed, on the south side of the house, the landscaping beds have grown to now encompass the original vegetable garden and many other large

beds under and between trees. Acquiring the various perennials for the beds has been fun!!!!

A new flowerbed means more unique perennials. One of the ways I have gotten new perennials, besides going to box stores or nurseries was trading with friends. Then, when there was nothing 'new' and unique at the stores or from friends, I took part in a group order to Italy for irises and organized a number of group orders to the US for irises, daylilies, hostas, peonies, etc. Another source of Siberian irises and hostas for me was Ensata irises. When the CWIS formed years ago, their bearded iris sales each summer began to be like Christmas to me!!! This summer, I am excited to see my all my new acquisitions of Siberian irises bloom.

Years ago, McFadyen's had a warehouse and a storefront in Brandon. One fall they had all sorts of irises on sale for \$1 each. Not knowing anything about irises I planted them into the garden. Of course, next spring, none of them had made it. I thought I had done something wrong in planting them. Later I found out that I had

planted them way to late into the fall. They had had no time to establish their root systems before the cold winter had set in. Now, if I acquire an iris in late fall, it gets planted up and grown in the house for the winter.

The highlight of summer 2011 was attending the American Iris Society convention in Victoria, BC. Seeing all the new varieties of tall bearded irises blooming was so enabling! Meeting old and making new friends while touring gardens is a great part of attending a conference!

I also paint. I love teaching Plexiglas 'stained glass' classes. These projects are placed outside, year round in the flowerbeds. The first painting I did was of irises (go figure!).

One thing I do enjoy is the selling of perennials at my Brandon Farmer's Market table. I love explaining to people how to grow the perennial, the location it can grow in, etc. As the perennials have multiplied in my yard I have been filling requests by others. What I can grow here on my acreage, anyone in a zone 2b or warmer garden should also be able to grow. Irises, when established, make wonderful clumps in the flowerbeds, and generally no insects or animals eat them. So they are a win-win perennial!
